

LETTER FROM CLAIRE MORGANS CEO

"The last two years have seen many changes for everyone as the Covid Pandemic saw the world turn upside down. September 2019 was set to be the start of an exciting year with the long awaited opening of Kingsley and Co, our steampunk Explorer children's bookshop and literacy project and the launch of the second Bootle Children's Literary Festival, but, as we clicked over into a new year, we saw the rapid rise of Covid across the planet leading to complete lockdown in March 2020.

Ykids then set out to rise to the challenge of supporting our children, young people and community whilst working remotely and with minimal staff taking turns to staff the office and phones. We learnt much during the first lockdown (like how to use Zoom) but took the time to invest in our digital skills, equipment and resource our community. We delivered thousands of activity packs for children, learned to deliver creative and engaging programming over Zoom and opened a community pantry.

By the second lockdown we had established tried and tested ways to continue to engage young people and as a result when we finally began to emerge as restrictions were lifted we were not only a better equipped and efficient organisation, we had also retained and even gained young people along the way.

The week that all restrictions were finally lifted was the beginning of the 2021 summer holidays. We delivered a free Dino Dig event that saw 6500 people attend over 3 weeks.



The last two years have been one of hardship and challenge for so many but we have sought to move quickly and adapt to meet the changing and growing needs of our community. We have seen lives changed, brought hope to those in dark places and helped create a sense of community against the odds.

None of this would have been achieved without the hard work of so many people. Our staff team, our volunteers, the clear guidance and support of our trustees and management team, and the many funders and donors who believed in us and enabled us to keep going in a time of such crisis.

We have been blessed by the generosity of spirit of our community and the kindness of our children and families that makes Ykids feel like a giant extended family.

As 2022 rapidly approaches we are aware that many new challenges lie ahead as we as a community recover from the pandemic. But, together we are stronger and can achieve so much more and it is a privilege to be part of a community filled with awe inspiring young people who want to make the world a better place.



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Our Vision

To equip children and young people to become world changers

Our vision is to raise world changers – young people who believe that they can, and then do make a difference. Our passion is to see young people grow up in an environment where they feel safe, loved and happy, overcoming challenges and circumstances to lead successful fulfilled lives.

Partnership: Working with others and building friendships. We believe that together we are stronger and we actively seek to work with partners to bring better outcomes for our community.

THE CHALLENGE



Let's face it – the last couple of years have been tough on everyone. From two years of fear and disruption during the Coronavirus Pandemic to the cost of living crisis, climate change and the war in Ukraine. This has been especially true for young people and those from less affluent backgrounds who have suffered most. From isolation due to digital poverty and lack of engagement with their friends, to food and fuel poverty, many children are now struggling to catch up and are suffering anxiety and fear for the future.

This is on top of the pre pandemic challenges of living life on the breadline in communities that are already struggling with low aspiration, poor attainment and high crime rates.

This report sets out our impact as we work to break cycles of deprivation and lift young people out of poverty and low aspiration, to make steps towards successful and fulfilled lives.

Bootle is a town within Sefton borough straddling two wards bordering Liverpool and sharing many characteristics of inner city areas, including high levels of gang activity, drug use, broken families and poverty, with some LSOAs ranked in the top 1% and 2% of UK's most deprived communities.

LOCKDOWN HITS BOOTLE



During March 2020 the UK found itself in the middle of rising concerns that it was in the middle of the global pandemic of Coronavirus and on March 23rd a full lockdown was announced and all non-essential public services, gatherings and work places were shut down in a bid to stem the rapid spread of the virus.

Ykids quickly recognised that many of the children, young people and families we work with would be badly affected by the outbreak and that we would need to put measures in place to support them through this crisis while also protecting staff and being part of the rapid response as key community partners.







Initially we identified 5 key areas where our children and families would need support:

SOCIAL ISOLATION | FOOD INSECURITY | MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING | FINANCIAL INSECURITY | DIGITAL POVERTY













HOW DID WE RESPOND?

Set up an Activity Website with hundreds of ideas of things for children and young people to do and access at home.

Activity packs: Delivered monthly activity packs to 300 children containing crafts, wellbeing resources, art materials, books, sweets and toys.

Birthdays: Delivered birthday presents to every child on our books during the pandemic.

Dedicated phone line:

Available to parents and young people who needed to reach out.

Online Family Quiz Nights and interactive challenges

Virtual walking groups

Craft packs and cards for the elderly: Enabling children to write letters and encourage older residents of local sheltered housing



1.To equip children and young people to make change in their own lives, build emotional resilience, self belief and life skills. TOTAL PROPERTY OF THE PROPERTY

Life can be tough for young people today whatever their background but more so if you are growing up in a deprived community with fewer opportunities. But with safe places to be and belong, people who believe in and champion you and opportunities to gain practical and life skills then anything can be achieved. We promote positive mental health and wellbeing and work to enable young people to grow in emotional resilience, personal confidence and hope for an exciting future. We want young people to be able to cope with whatever life throws at them, have plans and hopes for their future and skills to make their dreams a reality.

How: Youth and children's projects, CBT programmes, cooking, sport, arts and creativity and programmes designed to build life skills; school workshops and extra curricular education, events, mentoring, training opportunities, placements, faith projects, residentials and holiday clubs. We also deliver a range of projects to promote literacy through encouraging a love of all things story at Kingsley and Co.



Over the last two years we have delivered projects in person as much as was possible and by zoom when restrictions dictated.

Mentoring

We offer mentoring at the Kings Leadership Academy Hawthornes where young people are sign posted to us to support. Issues vary from needing support as they transition into the school, because they are refugees, because of poor behaviour or due to challenging home situations. Our approach as youth workers can be easier to access for some young people who find it difficult to talk to a teacher so we work in tandem to support the young person and find the best solutions and outcomes for them. Added benefits include enabling them to engage with the wide range of activities Ykids offers outside of school.

Cathedral transition workshops

Working in partnership with the Liverpool Diocese, Education Dept and other community organisations, Ykids delivers a series of Workshops aimed at supporting and encouraging year 6 children from church schools who are transitioning to secondary school. The High School survival programme destroys the myths and fears children hear about moving and gives them helpful tips to get through those first few days.

OUR SPHERE OF IMPACT

We work with many children, young people and families over a year but our levels of engagement differ from wider community engagement to intensive one to one support. We estimate that approximately 24,000 people benefit directly from our services each year and over 200,000 indirectly.

GIANT SLAYERS

Giant Slayers is a wellbeing programme that uses basic cognitive behavioural therapy techniques to enable children and young people to build emotional resilience by being able to identify their 'giants' (worries) and cut them down to size. The programme has been developed inhouse after finding that off the shelf programmes did not work with our children. The early intervention project offers 6 to 8 sessions offering practical and physical tools to enable young people to understand themselves and others, and embeds learning using creativity, action and a take social handbook/journal. The programme has been hugely popular and monitoring shows it has a significant impact on children's wellbeing, lessens anxiety and builds confidence. A teen version is now being developed in consultation with our young people.

Arty Pants: was an online art project. Each week the group of children had art material and snack delivered to their door and then explored and then created a piece of art over zoom. These included pin art, using clay, tissue art, paper sculpture etc... A short video was

then made and put on our YouTube channel to enable children to practice. At the end of the programme all 14 children gained an Arts Award.








The Bootle Horrid History Map: Exploring Bootle's industrial and Victorian history, and its funny and sometimes brutal past, children created content for the Kingsley & Co website including pictures, stories and videos. An illustrative map of old Bootle was created with QR codes taking people to the pages the children had made. Funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund, over 2000 maps were distributed to schools and the community.

Ready Steady Cook: was an online live and interactive cookery show delivered over Zoom. The team filmed from our large kitchen and themed each week. Teens then had ingredients and recipes dropped at their homes and were challenged to cook the meal and send in their photos and videos.







Ukulele Club: One of our interns was a skilled musician. 14 children were given their own instrument and then spent 10 weeks learning Ukulele. At the end of the project they made a music video to demonstrate their talents.

Ykids Rocks: Was designed to engage families over the Easter Holidays while social distancing was still in place. 50 Bright yellow rocks with Ykids logo on the front and an encouraging message on the back were hidden across Bootle and children were able to download an entry form and begin the search.





Grand Opening!

Grand opening of Kingsley & Co

In November 2019, Ykids delivered the 2nd Bootle Children's Literary Festival, and launched Kingsley & Co - a Victorian, Steampunk, Explorer themed children's literacy project and bookshop based in the Strand shopping Centre. The project was developed in response to poor literacy rates in Bootle (lowest 6% in the UK). We set out to encourage children to gain a love of all things story and therefore enhance literacy skills, promote mental wellbeing and increase attainment.

Designed as a place to inspire the imagination, Kingsley & Co offers a small café, hidden submarine themed classroom, quality second hand children's books for £1 and a showcase for local authors to promote their books. The shop also features moving bookcases, doors to nowhere, a Victorian sweet shop and fairy tale merchandise such as dragon ear wax, fang floss and unicorn droppings.

Literary Festival 2019

Offering a range of activities, workshops and events, Kingsley & Co has the backing of awardwinning authors including Frank Cottrell Boyce and Alan Gibbons, and Author, TV Presenter and Explorer Alice Hunter Morrison.

The Bootle Children's Literary Festival

Ran over 10 days in Nov 2019 and offered workshops with children's authors, artist and theatre companies both in schools and at Kingsey and Co. Children were able to explore the hidden Nautilus themed classroom, complete literary treasure hunts, take part in virtual reality spy hunt and meet authors at book signings. We also launched an anthology of children's stories entitled 'The Monster under my bed' and held a book signing for some of the winning young authors. Children also had the opportunity to meet Alice Morrison a real life explorer and Modern Mary Kingsley. The event worked with 15 school and 3465 children.

Post Literary Festival Kingsley & Co offered a programme of exciting Christmas themed workshops, from making gingerbread houses to snowmen and Christmas Wreaths. Kingsley & Co was gathering momentum when only a few short months after its launch the pandemic closed our doors and we were not able to open again properly until July 2021 with the Great Dino Dig.

Cartoon Competition

During lockdown we ran a competition for children to write a short story about our Kingsley & Co characters Mary Kingsley, Professor Cyril and their companions Dog and Camilla the Camel. The Professor had invented a time machine and in order to escape Lockdown they had been travelling in time. Winning short stories were then made into animated cartoons. We also commissioned a replica Time Machine and intended to use this as the focus for a 2020 Literary Festival, which unfortunately had to be postponed to November 2021.

The illustrated stories were then downloaded to a tablet embedded in the Time Machine and uploaded to our YouTube channel.

2. To encourage children and young people to be agents of change in their community

Young people often feel powerless and not listened to with others making the decisions for their lives. We work to enable young people to not only be heard but be agents of the change they want to see through role modelling, volunteering and social action. We encourage them not to just tell others their hopes and dreams but to make them happen.

How: Volunteering, young volunteer programme, youth and children's forums, social action projects, mentoring, peer mentoring, youth leadership, publishing their written work (poetry/stories/recipes) community art projects



Enabling young people to be world changers, to make a difference in the lives of others is one of our core objectives. During lockdown some of our young people went out of their way to embody this. While we worked to support the community, they made us gifts and cards to ensure that we were encouraged. A number took part in the 2.6 challenge and raised money for us and 3 took it upon themselves to walk a marathon in a day and raised over £1200.

Young people have continued to engage in social action both with us and independently – working with us to put on an afternoon tea for local elderly residents, donating toys, books and games, sharing positive messages through chalk graffiti. They have baked cupcakes to encourage others, made cards for those in isolation, and delivered gifts to a local shop owner that had been terrorised at gun point.

During 2019-21 we delivered:

- 2 year long full-time intern programs for 4 young people aged 18-20
- Young Volunteer Opportunities
- Community research project
- Training in project management and leadership skills for young people
- Training in using photography and video editing equipment
- Youth and Children Forums
- Apprenticeships
- Social Action and fund raising



Community Researchers

Young people were trained as community researchers and interviewed their peers over their fears and hopes for future employment. This was to try and gain funding towards a project that would bring the gap between what young people are taught in school about employment and what happens when the leave school.

One young person told us' They don't really tell us how to get a job in school, or the steps you need to take to get there.'

Another said' Any careers thing is only about office jobs ..not told about arts ..nothing aspirational ..nothing interesting ...always about money ...but its not about the money - its about having a job you enjoy'



DINO DIG VOLUNTEERS

Training

Young people have been trained in practical skills such as using cameras and video equipment, lighting and sound to enable them to help at events. They have also developed skills in editing, marketing and website development. Out internship programme gave training to young people in leadership and management skills, project development and a wide range of youth and children's work.



Volunteering

Over 35 young people have been involved in volunteering with Ykids over the last 2 years including in our intern programme, supporting children's groups, working at Kingsley & Co and supporting large scale events such as the Literary Festival, Believe Awards and Dino Dig. During the summer of 2021 18 young people supported the Dino Dig with some of them insisting on working full time hours during the event.

Rank Foundation

Over the last two years support from the Rank Foundation enabled us to support 2 x Time to Shine leaders and a Rank Aspire Programme leader. Both Time to Shine Leaders went on to full time employment with Ykids as did our Aspire programme leader for a short time before travelling before she moved to London to attend University. These have been incredibly valuable as the Foundation targets support to young people who have barriers to progression and invests in their skills, knowledge and self belief as well as funding the host organisation in order to pay them a salary. We also hosted a 2 week Community Action Placement for a young person that the Foundation

has identified as a future leader.

CASE STUDY

Names have been changed

My amazing little boy Daniel is a massive 10 years old, and in these short 10 years he has really suffered a lot of trauma. He was born with a very complex condition which has required him to undergo many surgeries which at times have been extremely painful and even torturous.

Generally, he is a loving, kind and clever young man but because he has suffered so much, there is a small part of him that cannot handle certain things he feels. Due to Daniel's medical condition, he is restricted physically as he may not have the energy or strength to build up his pace or muscles as quick as helps peers. He finds this hard to handle.

What a rollercoaster we have had with Daniel over the weeks he attended Ykids, The first weeks he attended must have brought his feelings to the surface and we were experiencing lots of, what seemed like anger, towards us. He seemed very confused. He even said once that he didn't want to go to Giant Slayers anymore as he just 'felt angry' when he left.

I spoke with Louisa about his concerns and she asked if I could bring him a little earlier so they could do some one to one before the club started. He agreed and when I picked him up that evening, he said he had a really good time. Daniel continued to attend the Giants Slayers for the remaining weeks and the difference has been amazing. He loves his thought jar. He has used it when he is feeling angry at us. He has now brought home his bag of 'tricks', as he calls them and enjoyed showing us why they are for.

Daniel has been using his new tools on how to express how he is feeling. He is starting to really accept that it is ok to feel the way he does and find better ways to express himself rather than kicking off. He has been taking the time to write down how he has been feeling and putting it in his other jar. He is seeing that he feels calmer later and is able to talk about those feelings better. He loves the thought bin! He likes to literally throw them into the bin. At the moment, it's still a work in progress but I can already see and few the difference with him. We will continue to work together with these new tools from Giant Slayers to make sure he is a happy young man.



3.To promote an environment and community where young people are heard, nurtured and can reach their full potential.

For young people to thrive they need to be nurtured, supported and given opportunities to grow, test new ideas, take responsibility and have a safe place to succeed and to fail. We seek to support young people by addressing the environment around them, creating opportunities, raising awareness, championing their voice at strategic levels, supporting families and engaging decision makers and influencers.

This includes: Family support work, community events and showcases, Bootle Children's Literary Festival, the Believe Awards, Intern training programme, being part of a wide range of networks and forums championing young people, training, networking with community influencers, leaders and churches.

Key Partnerships

- Well Sefton a project of Well North sponsored by Public Health England to bring transformation in 10 of the UK's most deprived communities.

Strand Community Group

The lower mall of our local shopping centre has been allocated as a community space and empty shops are being given over to local charities and support groups. As this community grew it became evident that there was the potential of clashing events and activities. We therefore in partnership with the centre management set up a community group for all the different community organisations working in the Strand to coordinate activities and support each other's large scale events. Moving forward there are discussions with Sefton Council around coordinating activities with the new Canalside Event space and the redevelopment of the shopping centre.

Liverpool City Region Cultural Awards

In late 2019 Sefton became the borough of Culture. Ykids Bootle Children's Literary Festival became one of the launch events. Unfortunately, just weeks later the pandemic was announced and many activities needed to be curtailed. In Feb 2021, however, at the height of the longest lockdown of the pandemic, our CEO Claire Morgans was recognised at the Liverpool City Region Cultural Awards and won the Borough of Culture Star of the year at an online ceremony, for her work in establishing the literary festival.




Community Pantry

In response to increasing challenges around food poverty we partnered with St Andrews Community Network to offer a Pantry offering low cost fresh, frozen and ambient food. Families whose children attend Ykids have the opportunity to become members and pay £3.50 per week for £20-£25 worth of shopping which they choose from our 'shop'. The pantry is overseen by the family workers but is being run by volunteers who sort deliverys and manage the weekly pantry. We also managed to secure funding to offer pantry free to members during school holidays and for a Christmas Hamper.

At Christmas we offered a Christmas Toy shop which operated in a similar way to pantry. Donated toys and gifts could be chosen for a weekly donation of £3.50 allowing families who were struggling to benefit and be able to choose toys suitable for their children.

A large part of our work in encouraging nurturing environments for children to grow and thrive is demonstrated through our family support work. This

Evaluations from our families work demonstrated that

- Over 50% of parents felt they were better parents as a result of support from Ykids
- 60% told us they felt better about themselves and had grown in confidence
- 85% told us they were always happy with the support they received from Ykids, while 15% said they were usually happy.

Transitions workshops

These take place in partnership with 'In Another Place' community theatre company, the Liverpool Diocese and Anglican Cathedral. purpose is to support children in year 6 of Church of England schools to transition to secondary schools. Ykids offers workshops and helps lead worship with interactive action songs. In June 2020 these were cancelled but in June 2021 we supported the development of online content which was then distributed to and watched schools thousands of children.


Monday Night Live

Monday Night Live offers a culturally relevant magazine programme of games, music, talks and challenges for young people who wish to investigate Christianity. Launching online during the pandemic, audiences grew to over 100. Once restrictions were lifted the event went live and meets every month and participants have grown from 20 to 67 and continues to increase. This has been a real opportunity for our young volunteers to learn new skills, have leadership opportunities and grow in confidence. 5 churches have partnered with us in this project and over 50% of those who attend are from a local secondary school



Equip

Equip is a follow up small group for young people who wish to learn more about faith. All are welcome to all our activities whether they have a faith or not, and are encouraged to explore questions and challenge ideas and find answers for themselves.



Internship Programme

Our Internship programme is specifically designed for young people who wish to explore a vocation in Christian and/or children's ministry, the internship gives young people aged 18-25 the opportunity to take a year out, gain leadership skills and take part in every aspect of Ykid's work.



Holiday Clubs and church weekends

It has not been possible to deliver many holiday clubs or church weekends over the last two years however we were able to support a weekend at Frontline church. Our theme was the Knights Code and we introduced children to ideas of Chivalry, explored the good and bad side of historical Knights, the Knights Code to serve God and others, and made our own armour.

Radio Show

During Covid we were also asked by All Stars Kids Club to create a Christian Children's radio programme. This was then broadcast multiple times across the UK and USA during Easter 2021

- And delivering a Pirate festival in the summer


Ykids has policies and procedures in place to ensure that all funds and resources are spent correctly and properly monitored. Our accounts are independently examined each year by DH Accountants.



LETTER FROM OUR CHAIR OF TRUSTEES

Like many organisations, responding to and emerging from the new and increased challenges created by the COVID-19 pandemic has been huge for YKIDS. As chair of trustees, I have been blown away by the creative and

determined way in which YKIDS responded to this challenge. This has meant the need to be both nimble and hold fast to our shared purpose serving the community of Bootle. Just before the pandemic hit we launched Kingsley and Co, an immersive bookshop with Victorian explorer theme. It has been fantastic to see this spring back into life and blossom, welcome hundreds of children and their families since it has been able to re-open, not least the hugely successful Dino dig. Re-connecting and making new connections with local families has been so important – it has also meant that we have first hand experience of the ongoing and new pressures on children and families.

We also saw the impact of the pandemic lead to an increase in demand for what YKIDS has been offering. Maintaining links through zoom sessions and the new links made through delivering 1000s of activity packs meant that even more families saw YKIDS as the people to turn to as pressures increased. We know that the cost-of-living crisis and the multiple pressures on parents, children and young people, exacerbated by the pandemic, has created ever more demand for support to build emotional resilience and there has been even more need to share effective tools and support to improve emotional wellbeing and mental health. The need has never been greater, the support YKIDS offers has never been more crucial.

Looking forward, one of the main challenges will ensuring that YKIDS has the capacity in space, funding and staffing to meet this increased demand. The YKIDS building is very busy now and we are needing to use other spaces to hold the events families are asking for. Our amazing staff team and volunteers have been working flat out to meet demand – we are so thankful to them and recruitment continues to ensure we can deliver and evolve to meet the needs.

I know I speak for all the trustees in expressing how proud we are of what YKIDS are continuing to achieve and how grateful we are to funders and partners who enable this work, sharing our vision...to equip children and young people to become world changers.
